Mrs. Betty Hummel, the superintendent's able secretary, is likewise always willing to offer a helping hand.



On October 20, James Sterrett spoke to the club on his trip to France and was enjoyed very much by every member.


For the next few meetings we found out the ideas of the members and how they wanted to spend the meetings. We found that several members had hobbies, so they had charge of meetings for awhile.

# Junior Hi- Y





Several innovations were noted this year. The majorettes twirled lighted batons at half-times while a new electric scoreboard added much to the average fan's enthusiasm.








The Grove City wrestling team, with eleven of this year's lettermen returning next year, is looking forward to an even more successful season on the mats in 1949.






