








The First Big Event


School Activities











Community

After a mid-season slump, the Eagles rebounded to play a high pressure and consistent brand of basketball, equal to any AAA team in the western half of


the state.



had a fantastic 219 assists as the GCHS playmaker.




















Grapplers End Another Fine Season






Golfers Swing Through Winning Season


