


Bed Head Day is one of the most popular spirit days at Grove City High School. Coming to school with pajamas and messed up hair is definitely the best way to get through another long day of school!










ESCHE PRIDE


What's Going On


WILL TO POWER





























The band did well in competition. They won first place in the Jamestown parade and second in the Greenville band show.


The band also began preparation for next year's semi-annual trip. The destination, yet to be decided. Fundraising by selling fruit and sausage began.


Saturday Science is a very popular activity among the Freshmen. The hours of sleep sacrificed were worth the learning experience.
