All of these experiences are truly humiliating and embarrassing. This can only mean that the Sophomore class is ready to take on anything in their future, even if it does include some mortifying moments.

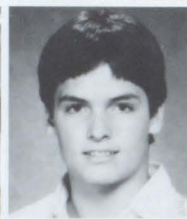

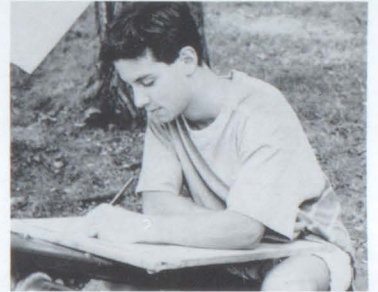

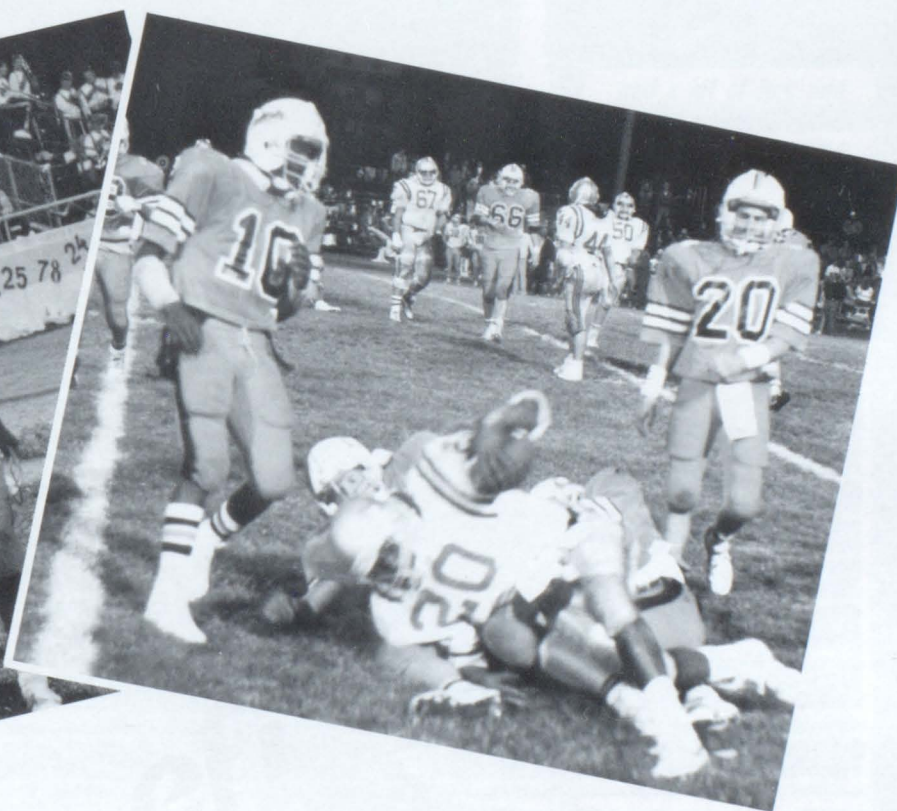

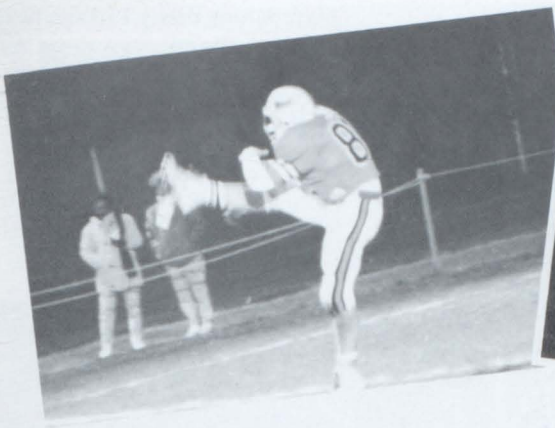

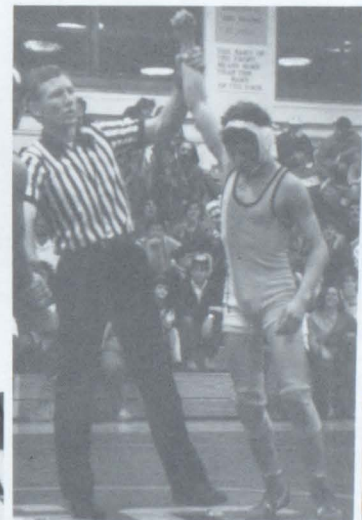

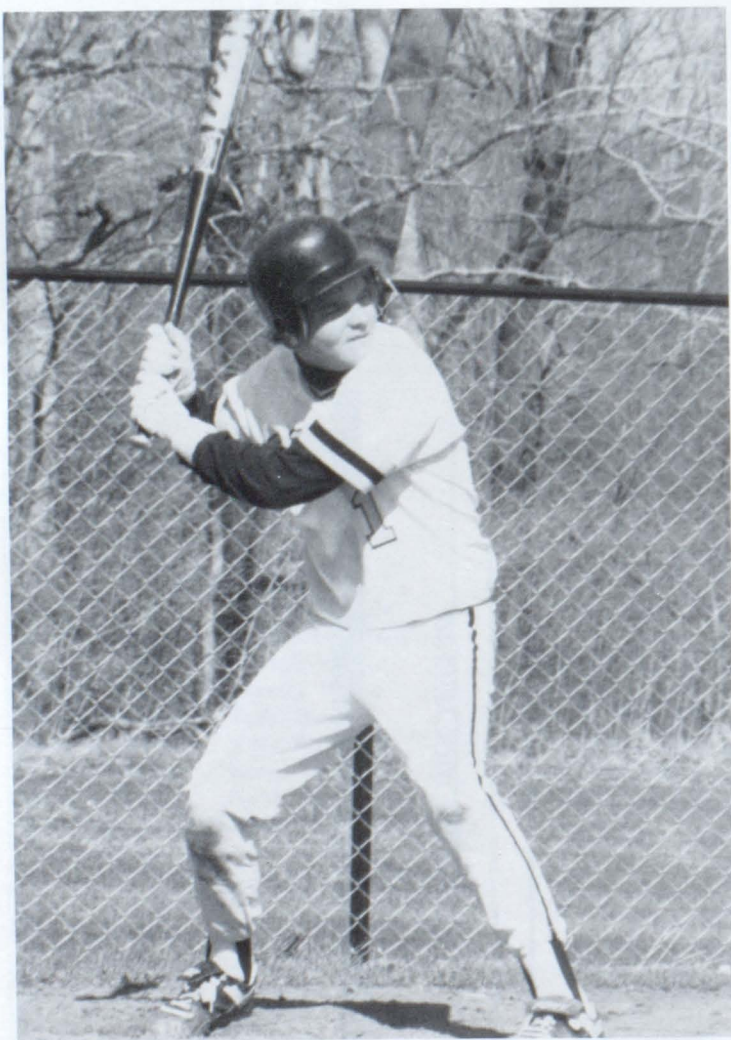

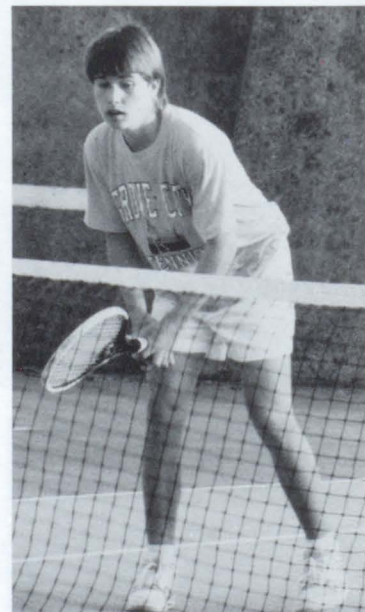
Tennis *Set For Victory*

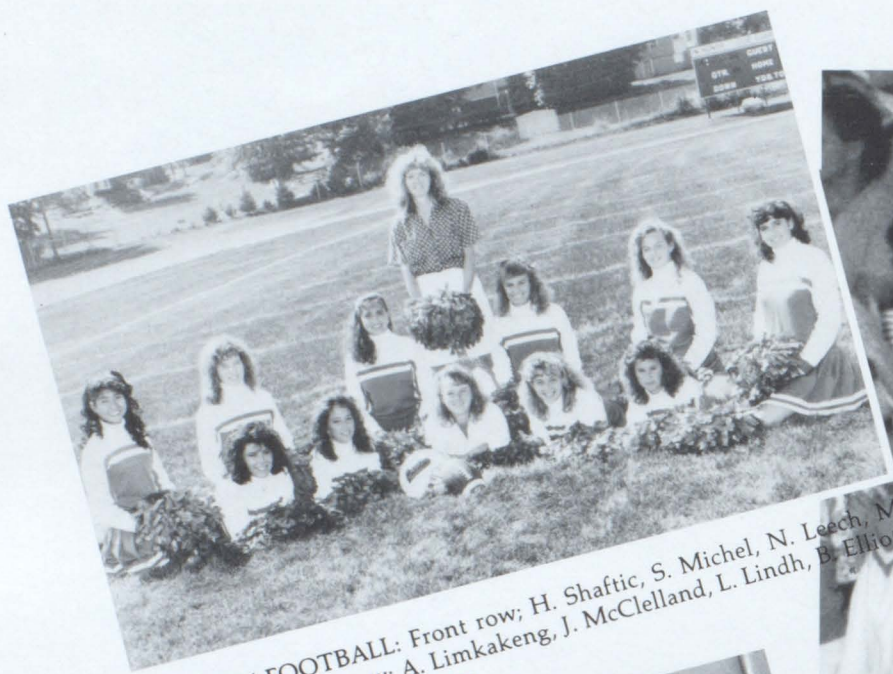

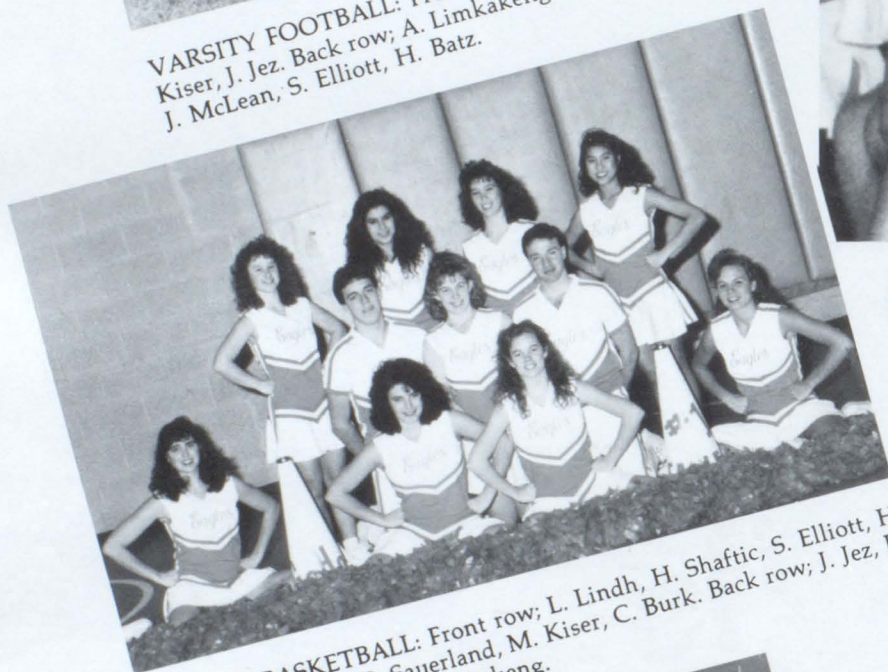

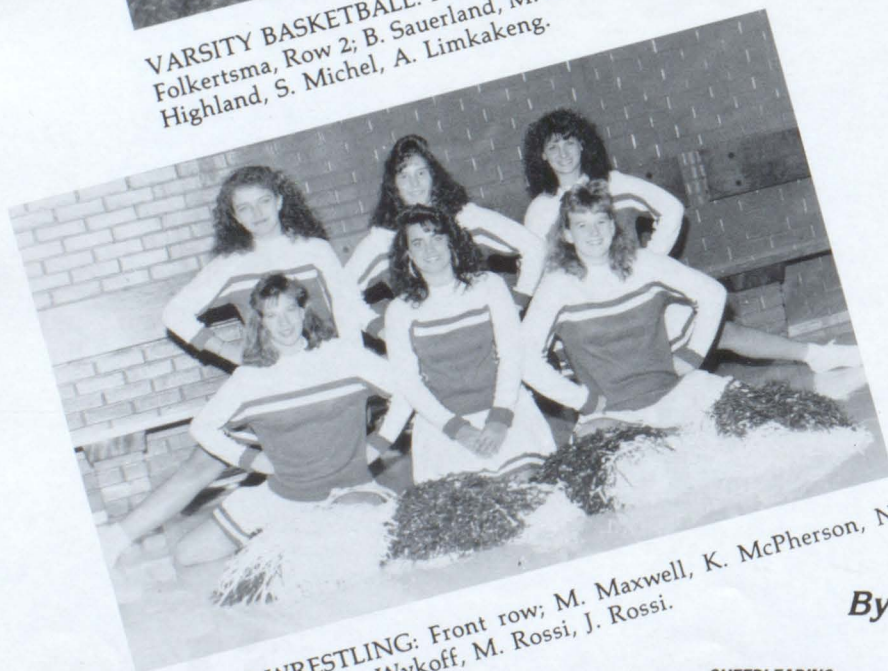

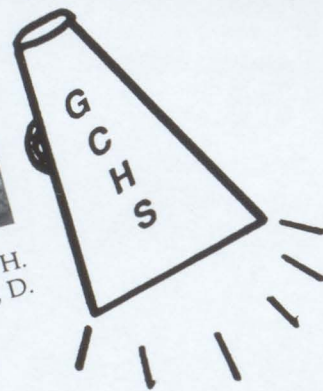

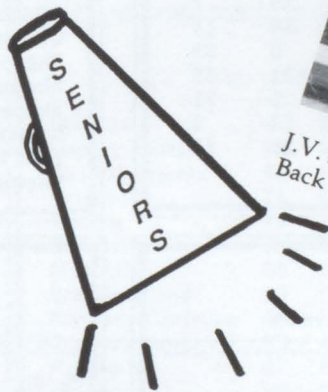

This annual award honors the memory of another outstanding athlete, Frank "Jiggs" Wolford. On October 19, 1935, Grove City played host to arch-rival Sharon. Having led the interference for a teammate who had just completed a 70 yard touchdown run, Frank,

"Jiggs", Wolford fell dead at the goal line. The cause of death was diagnosed as a heart attack. The tragedy was announced at halftime and the game was discontinued. A newspaper account stated, "Frank was more than an excellent football player, he was a pal of every student and every resident. He was known most for his extreme modesty."

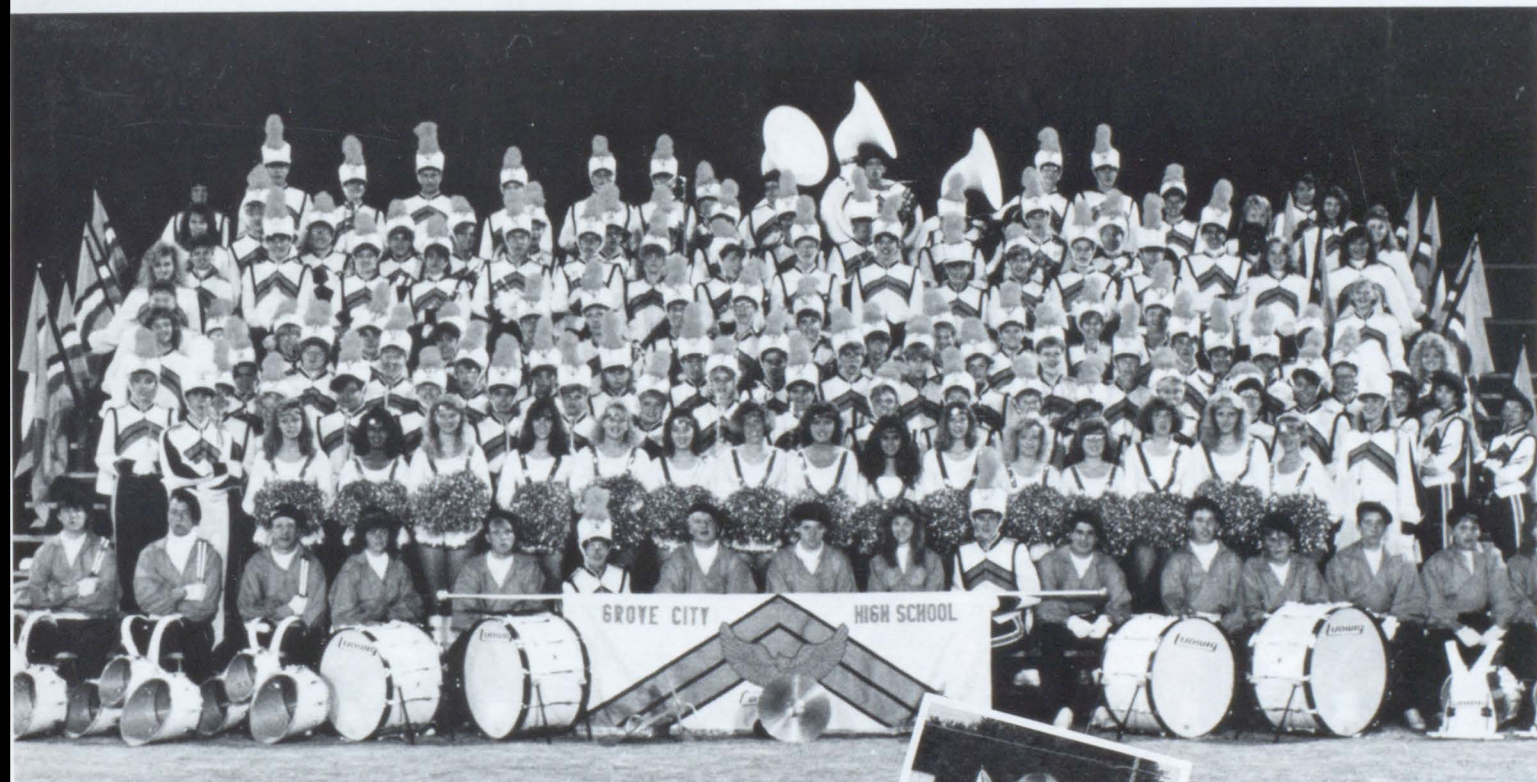

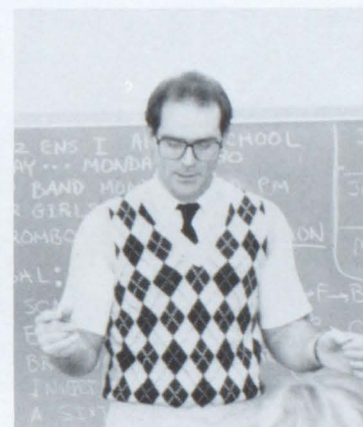

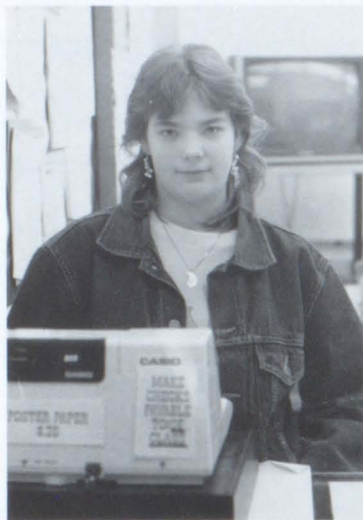

In the natural sun, sunscreen can be used to partially protect you from these rays. By using sunscreen, you can tan slowly and safely. However, there is no protection in tanning beds. Tanning beds contain pure UV rays, with a boost of a THOUSAND OR MORE above the levels found in normal sunlight. The sun can age the skin and cause skin cancer, but a tanning bed has the same results with DOUBLED chance of getting skin cancer. A normal suntan can protect you from sunburn, but a tanning bed tan does not offer any protection. Aside from health reasons they also cost you lots of money. So please be careful in the sun and stay out of the coffin!
