Yet a strangely optimistic season.










Pandemonium EXPLODED


As the energized Eagles started racking up the points.






A Special Feeling





Practice Makes Perfect





Once auditions are held and the cast is chosen, the process then leads into the rehearsals which include blocking, memorization, polishing, run-thrus, technical, dress and make-up, and finally performance. There is more behind the scenes than nervous actors.

The first two weeks were spent blocking the play. Saskia Davis, the stage manager, was concerned with every action an actor made. The actors learned where to go on what line and where to turn, sit, stand and so forth.

The next two weeks were spent memorizing lines. No scripts were permitted on stage. The actors did their best to remember their lines and remember where to go or what to do while they said their lines.

Advisor Miss Berky says, "I want the actors to analyze their characters and understand the world that the character lives in. Acting is much more than just moving and memorizing lines. We work to create believability and atmosphere. Acting is a difficult art. It takes energy, thinking and creativity." Therefore, each actor polished his or her character through emotions, gestures and the perfection of an overall attitude.

The run-thru rehearsals were a test for the actors. They were not only running their lines and moving, but also doing these things as someone else, their character. If I may fall back to the phrase . . . practice makes perfect . . . and it sure did. Characters were being perfected form an idea . . . to a living person.

There were many crews working on the set for the Matchmaker. The sets were wooden. They needed people to paint them and later to turn them during scene changes. There were a numerous amount of props acquired for atmosphere. There were girls who worked on finding costumes and personal props that each actor needed. (Of course, the actors helped out in the aspects of backstage preparation as well.) The light crews adjusted lights, focused them and practiced their changes. Everything from house lights and curtain to scenery changes were practiced over and over.

The make-up and dress rehearsals were the final steps before the performances. Thick make-up was layered on the actors. Each age line was drawn on . . . Each item from feathery hats and gloves to bow ties and top hats were added to the costumes . . . The actors did their best as if these last rehearsals were the actual performance.

This is a general view of all the hard work, long hours, dedication, energy, and talent that was behind the scenes to present the magnificent play, The Marchmaker.











WITH PLYOMETRICS

Tim Sloan, a Senior, describes plyometrics; "Plyometrics are a series of running and jumping exercises which are done in cycles. We do these in hopes of decreasing our times in our races but it is also a way to give us a little bit of endurance and ready us for the outdoor season, when the real work begins." He adds; "While you're doing the ply's you can feel yourself breaking down gradually. At first you feel nothing 'cause you're just starting. After a while though you find yourself tiring out and not being able to do the drills as effectively as when you first started. 


GCH CHEERLEADERS ATTEND CAMP








Nathan has had a great deal of experience to qualify him as the Junior Class President. He was also President of the Sophomore Class and Vice President as a Freshman.

Perhaps the main reason for the enormous participation was due to the major incentive-PRIZES! They ranged from t-shirts to large grand prizes such as stereos and telephones. 








Council Activities Soar










Community Awareness Builds


