
SCIENCE






BUSINESS






In Preparation









The Eagles were victorious in only one of the three Reynolds games. Vechnak's 23 points were high in the first game.




The fifth victory of the season was a triumph over Lakeview. Vechnak and Snyder led the Eagle scoring. GCHS lost the second game by one point.

Hickory, Mercer County Class A champions, defeated the Eagles twice this year by a total of eleven points: 2 in the first and nine in the second game.
















McLean sprints downfield while Davis throws block.


