

The Library Club and Talon staff educated others as well as themselves.





Although the early dismissal







The Dating Game





This year many Grove City High School students got tired of sitting at home being bored or going out and doing the "same old thing". The students searched for new and exciting activities which met their requirements for having fun.















Faced with obstacles all the way and yet Eagle wrestlers came out on top!










season of the Lady Eagles was cut one game short.










A Break In The Monotony






A great advantage was having someone to inform you about school before you got there. Joe Mowery felt that he had benefited from, his brother, David's experiences a




great deal, "If it wasn't for him, I would have made a real fool of myself a few times. Actually many times."
