








Student Life at GCHS Outdoors











Beginning the season running in hot, humid weather and ending in cold, snowy weather could only be one sport--CROSS COUNTRY. With the success of last season behind them, the boys team entered the season with high hopes. These hopes became a reality at their first meet when they blew away hosting Greenville, a team which posed a threat to the Mercer County title.

Aside from the success during the regular season meets, the boys proved themselves at invitationals. They placed 4th at West Middlesex, 2nd at Lakeview, 2nd at Central Catholic, and 7th at Rocky Grove.

Sophomore Kyle Black displayed an outstanding performance at the County meet, taking first place honors. The team won the County meet and the following week won the District 10 meet, thus making them the second team in Grove City cross country history to win a District meet. "It was great seeing their hard work and support of each pay off with a trip to State College," said first-year coach, Mr. Hough.







qualify for Districts. Out of the seven who went, freshmen standouts Joe Rendos and Mike Alderson won their matches.
















45 Minutes from Broadway









VOLUNTEERS: KEEPING US MOVING

Twenty-one-year-old tennis champ Monica Seles, returning to competitive play two years after being stabbed at a tournament in Germany, wins the 1995 Australian Open.



Hall-of-Famer Mickey Mantle, a switch-hitter and one of the great sluggers in baseball history, dies of cancer on August 13. Mantle hit 536 home runs in his 18-year career and compiled a lifetime batting average of .298.

The Atlanta Braves edge the Cleveland Indians 1-0 in game six to win the World Series on October 28. Closing pitcher Mark Wohlers leaps for joy.





In September, Baltimore Orioles shortstop Cal Ripkin, Jr., achieves a record-setting 2,131 consecutive games.
